1. Answer any **four** questions from the following within 500 words each: 15×4 = 60
- (a) How does Wordsworth express his romantic cynicism in the poem 'The World is too much with us'?
 - (b) Comment on the use of imagery in Shelley's 'Ode to the West Wind'.
 - (c) Attempt a critical appreciation of Keats' 'Ode to a Nightingale'.
 - (d) Matthew Arnold's 'Dover Beach' is a criticism of modernity – Discuss.
 - (e) How far is Browning's 'Porphyria's lover' a 'psychological poem'?
 - (f) Tennyson's 'Ulysses' reflects the Victorian spirit. Do you agree? Substantiate your answer.
 - (g) What are the chief symbols and images used by Hardy in his poem 'In time of the Breaking of Nations'?
 - (h) Discuss Owen as an anti-war poet with reference to 'Strange Meeting'.
 - (i) Yeats is a modern poet with the touch and feel of a Romantic. How far does the poem 'Lake Isle of Innisfree' reflect this?
 - (j) Auden's 'Musee des Beaux Arts' presents the reader with the hard realities of life – Discuss.

2. Answer any *three* questions from the following within 200 words each: 5×3 = 15
- (a) “The floating clouds their state shall lend to her; for her the willow bend” – Explain.
 - (b) Why is the West Wind termed “destroyer and preserver”?
 - (c) Why does Keats refer to the nightingale as the “deceiving elf”?
 - (d) Explain the phrase “Sea of Faith” as used in the poem ‘Dover Beach’ by Arnold.
 - (e) Locate the source of the following line and explain it:
“I cannot rest from travel: I will drink life to the lees.”
 - (f) “About suffering they were never wrong, The old Masters” – Explain.
